# **Paul's Story**

"I try not to focus on my problems. I try to focus on other people's problems." That's how Paul describes his approach to dealing with cancer. In fact, helping others is how Paul approaches his whole life, not just his cancer. It's what you might expect from someone who has spent years caring for others as an emergency room (ER) technician, a girls basketball coach and a homeless shelter volunteer.

"I'm going to fight with all the strength that I have, because that's all I can do and that's the type of person I am".

In December 2014, after experiencing persistent coughing and shortness of breath, Paul underwent a CT scan that revealed a large mass on his lung. The diagnosis was Stage IV lung cancer. As an athletic person who never smoked, Paul was shocked.

The day his doctor delivered the news, Paul found himself alone in the exam room while his wife stepped out to make a phone call. Fear and doubt crept in, and Paul wondered what his future would hold.

But he didn't stay in that mindset for long. He soon transformed his fears into actionable, positive affirmations about how he would continue serving others. He also felt grateful for his care team, which included some of the doctors and nurses he'd worked with as a technician in the ER.

"Coaching, my care team, my family and my kids keep me going. I wouldn't have made it this far without them".

Paul credits his strong faith in God and his dedication to serving others for his peaceful resolve in the face of cancer. He is also deeply grateful for his family. Every Friday morning, his wife and two young children welcome him home after his chemotherapy treatment. And by Friday evening, he is out coaching his basketball team. Though he has yet to make adjustments to his daily routines, his relationships with others give him focus and strength.

Paul stays positive by embracing what he can do, instead of focusing on what cancer has taken away. He continues to do what he loves most: caring for others. With that in mind, he always has a reason to get up in the morning to fight another day. "I'm still going to do all the things that I want to do, even with cancer".

# **Survivorship**

There are millions of adults and children in the United States who are cancer survivors. Many say that they felt they had lots of support during their treatment, but once it ended it was hard to make a transition to a new way of life. It was like entering a whole new world where they had to adjust to new feelings, new problems and different ways of looking at the world.

The end of cancer treatment is often a time to rejoice. Most likely you're relieved to be finished with the demands of treatment. You may be ready to put the experience behind you and have life return to the way it used to be. Yet at the same time, you may feel sad and worried. It can take time to recover. And it's very common to be thinking about whether the cancer will come back and what happens now. Often this time is called adjusting to a "new normal." You will have many different feelings during this time.

One of the hardest things after treatment is not knowing what happens next. Those who have gone through cancer treatment describe the first few months as a time of change. It's not so much "getting back to normal" as it is finding out what's normal for you now. People often say that life has new meaning or that they look at things differently.

Your new normal may include:

- Making changes in the way you eat and the things you do.
- New or different sources of support
- Not being able to do some things you used to do more easily
- Emotional scars from going through so much.

You may see yourself in a different way, or find that others think of you differently now. Whatever your new normal may be, give yourself time to adapt to the changes. Take it one day at a time.

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
